The children challenged the validity of the expulsion on the ground that it was violative of their fundamental right under article 25(1) of the Constitution. Decide.
 - (b) A non-profit making and non-political registered society has field a writ petition under Article 32 for espousing the cause of a large number of old infirm persons. Discuss whether in this matter, the society can file a writ by way of Public Interest Litigation.
 - (c) A public-spirited person approaches the Supreme Court asking for legalizing euthanasia for persons who are medically in a permanent vegetative condition. Discuss, in the light of Article 21, whether euthanasia can be legalized.

- (d) The petitioner was detained in jail under the Preventive Detention Act. He wrote a scientific book in prison and sought permission from the government to send it for publication. The government refused permission to him. Advise the detenu.
- (e) In a writ petition, the petitioners sought for issuance of writ of mandamus directing Union of India to implement equal pay scale in parity with other employees performing similar works claiming that equal pay for equal work is a fundamental right. Decide whether the equal pay for equal work is a fundamental right and the writ is maintainable.
