- III. Answer any **four** questions. Each question carries **6** marks.
1. The dying declaration of X was recorded by the doctor. It was clear in all aspects. To wind up the statement the doctor asked the injured if he had anything else to say. The injured X fell into unconsciousness without answering this question. Discuss the admissibility of this dying declaration.
  2. An accused remained in Police custody for a fortnight and was produced before the Magistrate for confession. The magistrate sent him to judicial custody for three days and then he was again produced before the magistrate. The Magistrate warned him and sent him again back to jail. Next day confession was recorded. Discuss the procedures to be followed for recording confession to make the same admissible as evidence.
  3. A case involving kidnapping and rape; in the FIR name of accused was not made nor was he known to the witnesses previously. The prosecutrix remained unconscious for 5 days after alleged kidnapping. Whether test identification is mandatory in such cases.



4. Whether Evidence can be submitted in the form of affidavits. Consider the legality of submission of affidavit as evidence.
5. Sam (accused) wrote a letter to Police officer confessing that he committed the murder of Raju. The letter was produced before the court. Accused opposed the same. Discuss the relevancy and admissibility of the letter.
